Q1 Text Solution:

The correct answer is **Option A**.

From the given options, '**with**' is the most appropriate answer to fill in the blank.

As we can understand from the sentence that she was pleased with something. '**Delighted with**' means to please someone with something, such as a gift.

• Example: He was delighted with the gift.
So option A is the most appropriate answer as it fits with the context of the sentence.

The correct sentence is: She was delighted with as well as surprised at her friend's fluke.

Q2 Text Solution:

The most appropriate meaning of the idiom "**walking on thin ice**" is **D. doing something risky**.

- **Doing something risky** accurately reflects the figurative meaning of being in a precarious or dangerous situation, just like **walking on ice that might break**.
 - Living this life is certainly like walking on thin ice.

Q3 Text Solution:

The meaning of the idiom "round peg in a square hole" is **D. A misfit**.

Q4 Text Solution:

Q5 Text Solution:

Q6 Text Solution:

Q7 Text Solution:

Q8. Text Solution:

- The passage discusses a revision of an earlier forecast to a lower number.
- **Uplifted** and **upgraded** suggest an upward revision, which isn't the case here.
- **Projected** simply means to make a forecast, without indicating a direction (up or down).
- **Downgraded** indicates a downward revision, which aligns with the context of the passage.

Q9. Text Solution:

The correct answer for the blank (2) is **A. into.**

- We need a preposition that shows that the revision is considered something.
- **Into** suggests the downgrade factored in the impact of the pandemic.

Q10. Text Solution:

The correct answer for the blank (3) is **C. ended.**

- The passage refers to a specific point in the past, the last quarter of the fiscal year.

- **Will end** indicates a future event, which isn't the case here.
- **Ends** is grammatically incorrect in this context. We need the past tense to describe a completed event.
- **Will ended** is not a valid verb tense.

Q11. Text Solution:

According to the passage, the reason why climbing mountains is difficult is because paths are usually very steep and some mountain sides are straight up and down [evidences from the passage: Paths are usually very steep. Some mountain sides are straight up and down, so it may take many hours to climb as little as one hundred feet.]. So the answer is **D.**

Q12. Text Solution:

The answer is most likely **A. To get the feeling of freedom.**

- The passage mentions that climbing a mountain gives a "**wonderful feeling of freedom.**"
- It specifically states that the prisoners **didn't** try to escape to Italy.
- Gaining fame as mountaineers isn't directly mentioned, and escaping a prison camp seems counterintuitive to wanting fame.

Q13. Text Solution:

The answer is **D. None of these.**

- **A. Mountain:** While the sentence talks about reaching the top of a mountain, it doesn't specifically describe the mountain itself.
- **B. They were not treated well in the prison:** There's no mention in the sentence about the conditions of the prison camp.
- **C. They liked climbing mountains:** We can't definitively say from this sentence



whether they enjoyed climbing in general. The focus is on the feeling of reaching the summit.

The sentence emphasizes the positive emotions associated with accomplishing a difficult climb. It doesn't provide details about the prisoners' background or preferences.

Q14. Text Solution:

The correct word for the sentence is **A. beneficial**.

- **Beneficial** is an adjective that means "producing good effects or helpful." This fits perfectly in the sentence, describing exercise as a positive activity.
- **Benefitial** is a misspelling of "beneficial."
- **Benefit** is a noun that means "an advantage or something that is helpful." We need an adjective here to describe "activity."
- **Benefited** is the past participle of the verb "to benefit." We need an adjective, not a verb tense, in this context.

Therefore, "beneficial" is the grammatically correct and semantically appropriate word for the sentence.

Q15 Text Solution:

The error is in part (3) of the sentence.

- **the more better you get (3):** This is incorrect. "**Better**" is already a comparative adjective. Using "**more**" before it creates a **double comparative**, which is not grammatically correct.

Therefore, the answer is **C. the more better you get**.

The corrected sentence should be: **The more you work hard, the better you get.**

Q16 Text Solution:

Error: "*He would succeeds*" - "Succeeds" should be "succeed"

The modal verb "would" indicates a conditional situation, and in such cases, the main verb should be in the base form (succeed, not succeeds).

Therefore, the answer is **A. He would succeeds**.

Q17 Text Solution:

The error lies in Part c) of the sentence.

In Part c) of the given sentence, the use of the conjunction '**or**' is wrong.

We use '**rather than**' to give more importance to one thing when two alternatives or preferences are being compared.

After rather /other, the conjunction **than** should be used.

Example: Maybe he'd rather listen than talk.

Hence, the conjunction 'or' in Part c) of the sentence should be replaced by the conjunction 'than' to make the sentence grammatically correct.

Hence, the correct answer is 'c'.

Q18 Text Solution:

The best option to fill the blank is:

- **A. a mention of you**

a mention of you: This is the most natural and grammatically correct way to express that someone spoke about you. "Mention" is a noun here, and "of" is the preposition used to introduce the topic of the mention.

Q19 Text Solution:

The most fitting idiom for the sentence is: **D. barking up the wrong tree**

- **D. barking up the wrong tree:** This idiom perfectly captures the situation. It means someone is pursuing the wrong course of action or looking in the wrong place. In this case, you're implying that the person accusing you is on the wrong track because you're innocent.



Therefore, "barking up the wrong tree" is the most appropriate idiom to use.

Q20 Text Solution:

Therefore, "Alphabetism" is the most suitable one-word answer.

- **Amateur** is the most precise term for someone who engages in an activity for enjoyment, not financial gain.

Q22 Text Solution:

- **Trump card** signifies a secret or powerful advantage that can ensure success. This closely matches the meaning of "hold all the aces."
- **In the pickle** means to be in a difficult situation.

Q23 Text Solution:

The correct answer is:

- **B. in**

The full proverb is "A bird **in** the hand is worth two in the bush." It means it's better to have something certain, even if it's small, than to risk losing it in pursuit of something bigger that might not be attainable.

Q24 Text Solution:

The most suitable phrase preposition to fill the blank is: **B. take over**

- **Take away:** This implies removing something from someone, which wouldn't be the case here.
- **Take over:** This perfectly captures the situation. It means to assume control or responsibility for something from someone else. In this context, Ankit will take over the managing director role when Rahul retires.
- **Take up:** This can imply starting a new activity.
- **Take down:** This suggests removing something or defeating someone.

Therefore, "take over" is the most appropriate phrase preposition for the sentence.

Q25 Text Solution:

The best option to introduce someone is: **B. to**

- **On** - The word on is used to refer to something that is touching the surface of something else.
- **To** is the most common preposition used to indicate the recipient of an introduction. "I will introduce you **to** my boss" means you'll be presented to your boss for the first time.
- **Too** is an adverb used for emphasis or comparison, not for introductions.
- **For** - We use for to talk about a purpose or a reason for something

Therefore, "I will introduce you **to** my boss this week" is the grammatically correct and natural way to express this.





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
