5. How do you help the elders in your family?

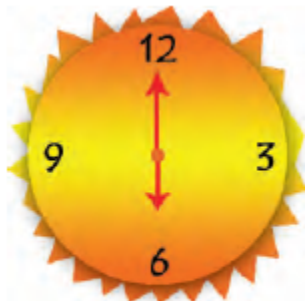
Answer:
