Answer:

In truth, Patrick completed all the homework on his own. He needed to assist the small person repeatedly with clear guidance and fetch books from the library for the homework.

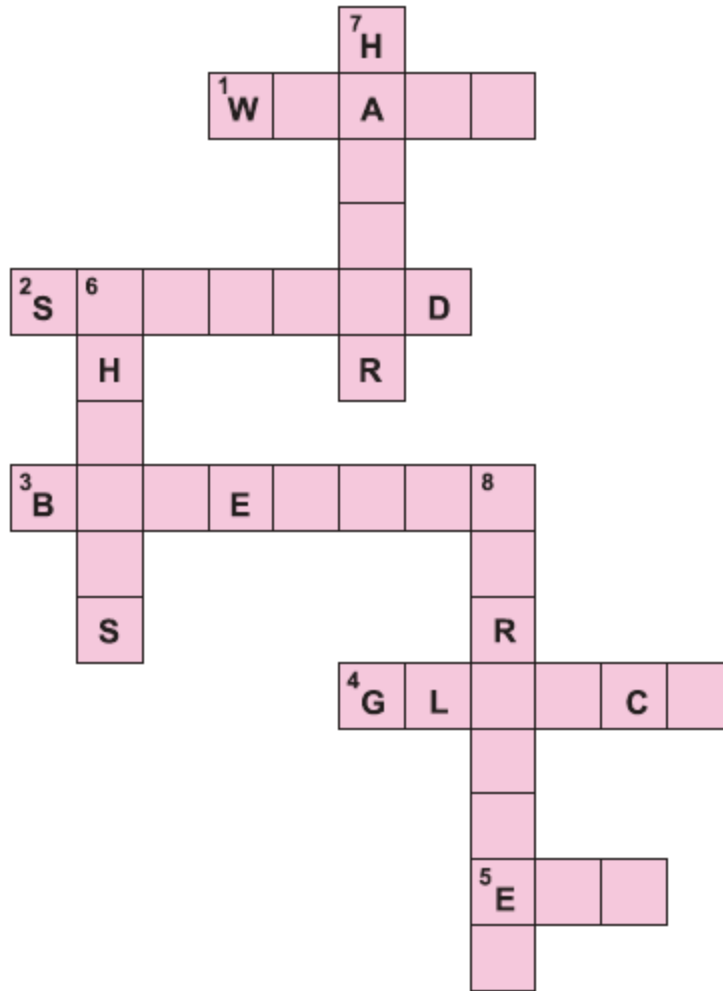

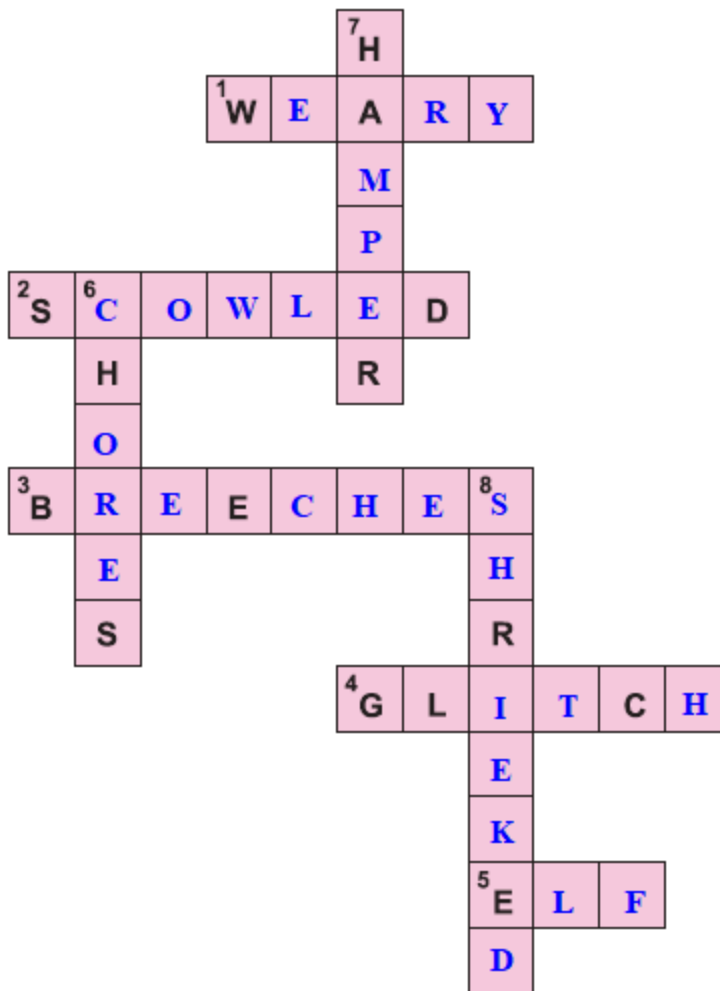

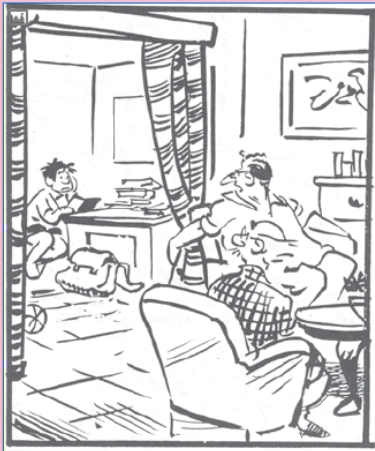
